


GIVING FUND

PPIE raises money in 4 key ways: business sponsors, signature events, major donors, and family giving. Each back-to-school season, during school registration, we ask for donations. Family giving makes up nearly 75% of our total funding. Our donation request is \$500 per family, which goes to cover the gaps in places we can make a difference for our students. While financial situations vary for many families, we do ask that those who are able to make a smaller donation, please consider doing so. PLEASANTON RUN FOR EDUCATION

This past April, we had an amazing time bringing our community together with our 11th annual Pleasanton Run for Education! Raising \$115,000, our signature community event brought us 3,000 participants including runners, sponsors, volunteers, and spectators in person for a fun morning of exercise, including a warm-up for the kids with school mascots. With 45 sponsors in attendance, there was something for everyone at our Race Expo. We were proud to highlight WORKDAY as our Presenting Sponsor, as well as PNC Bank as our Diamond Sponsor.



TEACHER GRANTS PROGRAM

Each year, PPIE awards teacher grants and student grants to help our community pursue innovative projects and programs to enhance their educational experience.

This year, one of those grants went to Gary Johnson, an engineering teacher at Foothill High School. Mr. Johnson saw a need for his engineering students: time and supplies for his students to explore the concepts presented in engineering while working on projects they are passionate about, the **Genius Hour in Engineering**.







Throughout the engineering courses, students learn various skills, and a common thread is that students want to apply these skills to projects they are passionate about. Unfortunately, this often costs money. That is where PPIE has been such a huge support for our program. Allowing students the opportunity to explore their ideas within the content area has led to some truly remarkable projects. This year, I have students working on making a plastic vacuum former, an autonomous shopping cart, an RFID attendance system, a custom RC car, a go-cart, a flight simulator, an air hockey table, etc. These are just some examples of the creative projects that students were able to work on thanks to the generosity of PPIE.

STUDENT GRANTS PROGRAM

PPIE provides grants of up to \$500 for student projects or special events that support student enrichment and interests outside the classroom. Our students are amazing and we love to see how they want to give back to their community through art, teaching, coaching, and inspiring others.

PPIE supported the Girls Who Code program last year, where participants are introduced to new concepts and guided through simple, interesting projects as an introduction to coding and its applications. Participants in Girls Who Code explore how to build and program robots, and through this discover how versatile and practical coding can be.





Through the Girls Who Code program, the participants are able to gain a better understanding of how fun coding can be, as well as meet new friends and become a part of a wider community. Our hope is that, even after this experience, the young girls will continue their coding journeys and use their experiences and skills to transform the tech industry.

LIBRARY SUPPORT

Librarians skillfully help students foster a love of reading, and develop their skills as critical thinkers. Research has shown that the amount of time children spend with books is crucial to reading achievement, and ultimately, to school achievement in general. By providing additional hours for our librarians, our schools are able to have their libraries open to students for the entire day. This means students have more time to be able to enjoy finding their favorite books, get lost in stories, and share reading adventures with their friends and peers. PUSD parents feel grateful to learn that their children are more engaged in unique library programs like, "Battle of the Books" put on by Mrs. Shackelford at Alisal, where the students can participate in teams and have their reading comprehension tested in a clever and entertaining way. Students are challenged to master their knowledge of books in multiple genres, expanding their awareness of new books and giving them a more well-rounded reading collection.

INTERVENTION SPECIALISTS

PPIE funds have made a huge impact on the intervention specialist role by supporting a MTSS (Multi-Tiered System of Supports), making intervention and enrichment available across all our schools. This beneficial program builds a framework for teacher teams to support all learners, allowing students to gain additional support that is tailored to their specific needs.

WELLNESS SUPPORT

As wellness for students continues to be a growing concern amongst parents and educators in our community, PPIE is honored to provide ongoing support through the Student Assistant Program Specialist, Monica Wharton. Monica's position plays a critical role in ensuring that the Wellness Centers at both high schools are running smoothly, and also in creating impactful wellness programs that offer a quiet and safe place for students to decompress and connect. Monica has also made peer-to-peer programs available, such as the AV Mentors at Amador Valley High School and Peer Advocates at Foothill High School. These groups provide mentorship between freshmen and upperclassmen during the first year of high school, lunch buddies, and assistance with activities during California Student Mental Health Week. Thanks to PPIE, our students are able to receive more immediate support and access to wellness resources and programs, allowing them to prioritize their mental health and set them up to gain the necessary coping skills to thrive in high school and in life.
